#### Goodrich active In Experimental Work

Thortly after the Wright brothers made their first historic flights in an airplane from the sand dunes of Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, the B.F. Goodrich Rubber Company, America's oldest manufacturer of pneumatic tires, began the manufacture of a few rubber products, including tires for aeronautic uses. In the years which followed the uncovered fuselage and pusher engine period, Goodrich devoted increasing thought and experiment to the fledgling aeronautic industry, constantly improving its products to meet the requirements of this new means of transportation. Following the world war period, during which time Goodrich manufactured balloons and airships for the government as well as tires for the United States and its allies, the company purchased an airplane to be used for the testing of rubber products designed to make safer the flight in air, and to cushion the landings and takeoffs of airplanes on the ground.

Consequently Goodrich has taken a prominent part in the development of aeronautics in this country and in Akron, maintaining its test plane at the Municipal Airport, testing new products in this vicinity, and using the now famous airplane "Miss Silvertown" in carrying company officials and products throughout the country.

Aluminum Overcast is owned and operated by the EAA Foundation.



Currently it is scheduled to arrive AKR on the afternoon of July 5<sup>th</sup> and will give a flight to members of the media that are brave enough to take to the blue sky. It will depart for Columbus, Ohio on the 8<sup>th</sup>.

Just to give you some of the particulars of the EAA B-17. The actual model number is B-17G-VE, and it's serial number is 44-85740. It was nicknamed Aluminum Overcast, and was delivered to the Army Air Corps on May 18<sup>th</sup>, 1945. Although this plane was born and delivered too late to see action in World War II, it does have an interesting history.

Some of it's history includes being purchased from the military inventory in 1946 for......are you ready for this.....it might make you sick when you read it.......\$750.00. (This number is correct). The plane has flown more that one million miles. It has served as a cargo hauler, an aerial mapping platform, and in pest control and forest dusting operations.

While the B-17 is at Fulton, we are in need of
